# Caring During Crisis

This spring was tough. The world was turned upside-down. Families lost loved ones.

Like most businesses, our operations had to halt for a time and then adapt. We normally give shoes through schools – since it’s the most efficient way to ship and distribute shoes – but schools were closed.

To keep the kids, the teachers, and the volunteers safe, we had to hit pause on large deliveries and events. But through it all, we continued to work with shelters, social workers, and schools on an emergency basis. It has been truly heartwarming to see the lengths our educators will go to help their kids during times of crisis.

Many parents have been laid off from their jobs or lost hours. Or they have had to close their small businesses, shops, restaurants or salons. What little savings they had were used up. For families already struggling, this has been a hard blow. Even for families who had been doing fine, it was an unexpected curveball.

The need for shoes has exploded. More families are struggling to afford groceries, much less new shoes for their kids’ growing feet. **Our neighbors need our help.**

**We’ve pivoted and we’ll continue to adapt to the ever-changing landscape. We are committed to being there to help families in need.**

In this report, we are telling stories of hope. Stories of individuals and teams coming together to help their communities. Stories of generosity like yours. Some stories happened before Covid-19, and some during.

**We intend to go forward and create more stories of hope and generosity.** With your help, we are excited to give shoes to even more kids and families in need.

The Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation joined Shoes That Fit and the LAPD in delivering shoes to 220 students at Ricardo Lizarraga Elementary.

Dodgers outfielder AJ Pollock helped kids try on their new kicks to make sure they fit. The kids were thrilled to meet a Dodgers star. And that evening, AJ hit three home runs for the boys in blue! (Coincidence? We think not! Giving shoes brings good juju.)

The Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation CEO Nichol Whiteman and LAPD Chief of Police Michel Moore also attended and helped the students try on their new shoes.

The Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation is dedicated to creating opportunities for kids to engage in sports, stay active, and succeed in school. We think it's a great fit with

Shoes That Fit's motto of **learn, play, and thrive**. When kids are wearing shoes that are too small or too worn out, they are held back from participating fully on the playground and in the classroom. A brand new pair of shoes that fit allows a kid to be comfortable and confident.

The Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation is helping 600 children across LA as part of a \$20,000 grant to our Operation Shoes That Fit LA program.

# Kershaw's Challenge

As 2019 closed (and we were all blissfully unaware of the craziness that 2020 would bring), Clayton Kershaw and Kershaw's Challenge ended the year with a commitment of \$25,000 to Shoes That Fit to help children in need.

*Kershaw's Challenge* is a faith-based, others-focused organization founded by Dodgers pitcher Clayton Kershaw and his wife Ellen.

Ellen and Clayton shared their motivation: "When we first heard about Shoes that Fit, we knew immediately that we had to get involved. They are actively moving towards schools and kids to meet a basic need: new shoes that fit their growing feet. It seems so simple and yet **having 'shoes that fit' is a privilege that many kids don't get to experience.** Kershaw's Challenge considers it an honor to help Shoes That Fit provide shoes for kids in LA and Dallas."

**And a few months later, Ellen and Clayton made an even bigger commitment: a \$200,000 grant to help 8,000 children in Los Angeles and their hometown of Dallas.**

As a father of three, Mario knows how fast children grow out of their shoes. He described “Shoe Day” as **“the best feeling in the world... to help kids!”**







# Helping When Home Isn't Safe


Quarantine, Social Distancing, and Safer at Home all have one thing in common: staying home.




# Modeling Leadership

# Hero Teachers in New Jersey

Meghan Santonacita, a science teacher at Colts Neck High in Freehold, NJ, noticed something. **“When students don’t have their basic needs met, everything else is so much harder for them.”** Her school provides some basic necessities - toiletries, winter coats - but some students wore flip flops and bedroom slippers to school, and she didn’t think it was a fashion choice.

So Meghan enlisted the help of her colleagues to raise money for athletic shoes for these kids. In the end, support rolled in from teachers, custodians, counselors, supervisors, principals, and staff across the entire district. Together they raised \$3,000 to help 100 students in Freehold get brand new sneakers.

“When the students received their shoes they were so thankful. In the privacy



of the counselor’s office, the interaction allowed counselors to explore other potential needs that the students might have,” Meghan explained.

**“When students feel secure and comfortable, they have a better chance of learning and finding success in school.”**

**“The teachers and educational professionals**



**of Freehold care deeply about the well being of our students and are proud of this effort.”**

Meghan and her colleagues are looking forward to helping 50 more students in the fall.





# It All Started With A Note

## Teacher Starts Campaign in Bullard, TX

A 5th grader slipped a note to her teacher, Kristen Anthony, asking for a pair of hand-me-down shoes.

**“We know our kids. We know who is suffering, and we step in to help,”** Kristen

explains about her colleagues. In helping that first student, Kristen saw first hand **the impact a new, well-fitting pair of shoes could have.**

She and her husband, Bobby, joined Shoes That Fit to raise funds to provide new shoes to more kids in need. Not sure what to expect, they were overwhelmed with the outpouring of support. “It’s so fun to see the community come together

and watch the little financial clicker go up,” says Kristen. Setting out with a goal of \$3,000 to help 100 kids with brand new sneakers, they quickly exceeded that and raised more than \$6,000.

When they delivered their first “wave” of shoes, Kristen remembers this “one little boy, he didn’t even have socks, his shoes were so tight. We gave him a pair of socks and new shoes. When he put them on, he just smiled. **He said, ‘these**

**are SO comfortable’ and he couldn’t stop smiling.**

When he walked out of that office, I could see him holding his head a little bit higher.” Kristen and Bobby hope to expand and reach even more kids in Bullard, and to inspire more giving. Bobby explains, “I would love to touch every community around ours so that they all have Shoes That Fit.”





# Seeing Themselves in Students They Serve

Filipp Chebotarev and his sister Polina Chebotareva moved to the US when they were children. Their family immigrated to the US from Moscow following the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1993 with nothing but the clothes on their backs.

Their first few years were rough. Philipp and Polina had to learn a new language and a new culture. Even the alphabet was different. They were putting down roots in a new place. Philipp and Polina knew what it was like to not have the shoes or clothes they needed. They knew the embarrassment and pain of wearing old shoes that were too small.

Filipp and Polina grew up and became successful entrepreneurs and owners of the Cambridge Companies SPG. But they never forgot what it was like to be the new kid, the immigrant kid,






